

## **Head Lice Prevention and Control Checklist- Parent Information**

In addition to nit picking, combing with a proper lice comb and the use of lice treatment products here are some additional guidelines for preventing head lice re-infestation and transfer to other people. Get in to the routine of checking your child's head regularly even if they do not have active head lice. This is especially important after school breaks, camps or sleep overs. EARLY DETECTION, COMBING AND NIT PICKING ARE THE MOST ESSESTIAL STEPS FOR GETTING RID OF LICE.

Towels and Bedding

Use a clean towel for every bath or shampoo. Store apart from other laundry and wash separately.

Wash bedding in hot water and hot dryer whenever live bugs are found and once per week until all nits are gone.

Limit bedding to sheets, blanket and one pillow until lice have been gone for 2 weeks.

Change pillowcase frequently as long as nits are present and every time lice are found.

Put pillow in dryer for 20 minutes every time lice are found.	
Combs, Brushes, Hair Articles	
Each family member has own comb and brush kept separately.	
Bag hair items, headbands for 2 weeks, unless washable.	
Boil all brushes/combs for 10 minutes. Repeat daily until no evidence of lice is found.	
Repeat once weekly as a proactive measure.	
Furniture and Toys	
Child with lice sits in only <u>one</u> chair for 2 weeks.	
Child is only allowed in <u>one</u> bed.	
No one else is allowed in that bed or chair	
Put all play things used in past 2 days that are soft, fuzzy or have hair in sealed plastic	
garbage bags for two weeks – unless washable.	
Other items that have contact with the head and neck that are not washable or dry	
cleanable need to be bagged. IRONING IS ALSO A WAY TO KILL LICE.	
Vacuuming (Start with a new bag for good suction)	
Vacuum chair every day or two	
Vacuum carpet where child plays 2-3 times per week.	
Vacuum all sides of child's mattress.	
Vacuum floor after nit picking (change vacuum bag after).	
Car	
Vacuum car upholstery whenever live bugs are found and once a week.	
Child sits in one seat in the car and no one else sits there.	
Clothes	
Wash all clothes that touched the head and neck in the past 48 hours or limit to 10-15	
washed outfits for 2 weeks kept in a clean area to avoid washing all contaminated	

clothing. (Leave the rest in closets, dressers, or bags for 2 weeks).

Put in laundry after wearing one time – separate from other laundry.		
Wash clothes in hot water and dry on hot dryer setting.		
Put away "dress up" clothes when there are head lice (wash or place in plastic bag if		
used recently).		
Jackets and Hats		
Put hat, mittens, and scarves in sleeve of jacket.		
Hang jacket away from other jackets, clothes or upholstery.		
School, Daycare or Friends Homes		
Contact school or day care and investigate where child hangs coat, hats, naps, etc. Keep		
cots and blankets for napping separate.		
In places where a child does not have a separate cubby or locker have children place		
coats, jackets, hats and scarves in green garbage bags.		
Restrict your child from participating in activities where there is a greater chance of		
head to head contact until the issue is resolved.		
Encourage your children not to share their hats, clothing, hairbrushes/combs and hair		
accessories with other children and to avoid head to head contact.		
Ask daycares/day homes remove play clothing, blankets and cloth furniture until the		
issue is resolved.		
Call parents of friends your child has played with in the past two weeks and advise them		
to check heads.		
Have children who share a locker or hooks or close contact checked.		
Do not go to school, daycare or to visit others until live lice has been treated and		
removed.		
Avoid places or take precautions where lice can spread easily (e.g. camps, sleepovers).		
Notify teacher or daycare provider every time your child has lice.		
Find out whom your child sits by on the bus and have them checked.		
Send a separate bag to school for your child's jacket, hats etc. to avoid catching from		
nearby coats.		
Keep long hair in braids or tied up in ponytail.		
Spray hair gel, hair spray or a weak solution of essential oil on hair before children go to		
school and/or camps. This will help deter lice.
